Mr. Alexander Contee Hanson having resigned the office of clerk to this house, Mr. Richard Ridgely is appointed in his stead.

The senate adjourns till to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY, March 14, 1778.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. Mr. Richard Ridgely qualified as clerk to the senate, by taking the oath of fidelity prescribed by the constitution and form of government, the oath directed by the act, entitled, An act to punish certain crimes and misdemeanors, and to prevent the growth of toryism, subscribing a declaration of his belief in the christian religion, and taking the oath of office.

Mr. William Tuck was appointed messenger, and Jonathan Parker door-keeper, to the senate. His excellency the governor communicates to the president a letter from Henry Laurens, Esq; president of congress, of the 1st of January last, enclosing an act of congress, of the day preceding, for promoting a speedy reformation in the army in discipline and œconomy: A letter and act of the 12th of January, relative to the securing of salt: A letter of the 17th of the same month, enclosing an act of congress for suspending the embarkation of lieutenant-general Burgoyne, and the troops
