By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, December 1, 1778.

"May it please your Honours, IN full confidence that we shall agree in every thing that is essential relative to the confederation, this house have appointed Mr. Hall, Mr. Thomas, Mr. J. Hanson, Mr. Chase, Mr. Hughes, and Mr. Polk, to join the members named in your message of yesterday by Thomas Jennings, Esq; to prepare the declaration and instructions for our delegates to congres.

By order, J. DUCKETT, cl. ho. del. The engrossed bill No. 5, was read with the paper bill thereof, and assented to; which engrossed bill was thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 21, 1778: Read and assented to."

The bill, entitled, An act to empower the justices of Dorchester county court to appoint a constable for the town of Cambridge, was read the first and second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by Robert Goldsborough, Esq;

The resolution of the house of delegates of the 12th of November, respecting the records of Anne-Arundel county; and also the resolve relative to the allowance made by that house for Mr. Elie Vallatte, were read and assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by Charles Carroll, Esq; Barrister.

By the SENATE, December 1, 1778.

WE consider the appointment of a court of appeals as a measure absolutely necessary to carry into full effect our present constitution and form of government; we think the appointment ought not to be longer delayed. If you should be of the same opinion, it will be proper to fix the numbers of the judges of the said court, and their salaries, before we go into a nomination of them.
