Amendments to the above bill.

In the eleventh line of the first page, after the word "state," insert "by land or water." In the eighth line of the seventh page, after the word "states," insert the following clauses: "And the governor and council are hereby required to inform congress of such supplies as the said governor and council shall suffer to be exported on the application of the said minister or agent.

"And provided also, That it shall be lawful for the governor and council to give permission to such persons as reside in the adjacent states, and have landed property within this state, and raise produce thereon, to draw such supplies from their said farms and plantations as they may want for the subsistence of themselves and families, such persons previously making oath, that such supplies are wanted for such purposes, and not for sale."
