

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER, 1779. 3

Chase, James Brice, Daniel Carroll, and John Brice, Esquires, had a majority of votes. Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that John H. Stone, Jeremiah Townley Chase, James Brice, Daniel Carroll, and John Brice, Esquires, are duly elected members of the council to the governor.

ORDERED, That the president of the senate be requested to join the speaker of the house of delegates in a letter to Thomas Sim Lee, Esq; notifying to him, that he is appointed governor of the state of Maryland, and desiring him to take upon himself the execution of his office. Messieurs Key and Williams, from the house of delegates, deliver to the president the following message:
