BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, MARCH 30, 1780.

The house took into consideration the recommendation of congress of the 11th March instant, and thereupon RESOLVED, That the governor and council be requested to direct, that a quantity of flour may be delivered to Mr. Holker, or his agent, which, with what he has been already permitted to purchase by the authority of this state, may in the whole complete the quantity of fifteen thousand barrels.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, MARCH 30, 1780.

Whereas it appears by the representation of the commissioners for Worcester county, that they have procured twelve thousand bushels of Indian corn in that county, the greater part whereof lies on the sea-board ; that the conveyance to the different landings on the Chesapeake or Delaware bays will be very inconvenient and expensive, and that the same could be transported with expedition and at a much less expence from Sinepuxent inlet to Trenton in the state of New-Jersey ; therefore RESOLVED, That the governor and the council be authorised and requested to direct the said corn to be shipped from Sinepuxent inlet for Trenton, or any other place on the river Delaware which they may think proper, or to any place his Excellency the commander in chief may require.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, MARCH 30, 1780.

Whereas it is represented to this general assembly by David Poe (who was appointed by the governor and the council to act in the quarter-master's department at Baltimore-town) that he is at present entirely destitute of money ; that the post at that place cannot be supplied with forage ; that the public service will greatly suffer, and a number of horses, now under his care, in a few days will be without forage, unless he is immediately supplied with money, which cannot be obtained in time from the continental treasury ; therefore RESOLVED, That the governor and the council be requested to furnish the said David Poe with fifteen thousand pounds for the use of his department, which said sum is to be charged to the United States, and for which the said David Poe is to be accountable.
