BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, MAY 1, 1780.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be authorized and empowered to order the corn, rye, and flour, stored by Thomas Beatty at Wright's ferry, to be sold, and to order the corn sent by the said Thomas Beatty to York-town to be sold or delivered to any deputy quartermaster of the United States.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be authorized and empowered to appoint fit and proper persons to receive and store provisions, at such places within this state as are appointed by the commander in chief, or such others as they may think necessary, and that the persons so by the governor and council appointed deliver and issue the said provisions to such person or persons as may be appointed by congress to receive the same, and to the order of the governor and council.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council allow to the persons by them appointed for the purposes aforesaid such reward for their trouble or service, to be charged to congress, as they may think adequate thereto.

RESOLVED, That the president and speaker inform congress, that a considerable quantity of flour and grain has been procured by this state for the use of the United States, and that this state will take every effectual measure to furnish its quota of the supplies required by the resolve of congress of the 25th of February last, and request congress to appoint proper persons to receive the supplies to be furnished by this state.
