On motion, the bill, entitled, An act for bringing into the treasury the sum of twenty million five hundred and forty thousand dollars, and sinking the same, according to the requisition of congress, was sent to the house of delegates by William Hindman, Esq; with the following message:

BY THE SENATE, MAY 6, 1780.

GENTLEMEN,

ON the first reading of your bill, entitled, An act for bringing into the treasury the sum of twenty million five hundred and forty thousand dollars, and sinking the same, according to the requisition of congress, we find two clauses contained in it, one for making the new bills of credit, to be issued in virtue of the resolves of congress of the 18th of March last, a legal tender; the other, pledging the faith of this state for the redemption, without abatement or discount, of the certificates given for monies borrowed by the state, and its bills of credit; both which, in our opinion, are unconstitutionally connected with the bill, as they contain matters not immediately relating to, and necessary for, the imposing, assessing, levying, or applying, the taxes or supplies to be raised for the support of government, or the current expences of the state, and therefore ought not, consistently with the 11th article of the form of government, to have been blended with this bill. For this reason, we have returned the bill, that you may separate those clauses from it; when they are separated, we shall resume the consideration thereof, and give it all the dispatch in our power.
