BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 21, 1780.

It appearing to the general assembly, that Mr. Robert Wood, a committee-man for Frederick county, under the act of assembly, entitled, An act for the more effectual preventing forestalling and engrossing, and for other purposes therein mentioned, passed at a session of assembly, held on the twenty-second day of July, seventeen hundred and seventy-nine, had received from a certain Elias Ransburgh, of Frederick county, on the 24th day of September 1779, the sum of three thousand pounds current money, on loan to the continent, and had not paid the same into the continental treasury, or obtained a certificate for the aforesaid Elias Ransburgh; therefore

**RESOLVED**, That the treasurer of the western shore issue a certificate to Elias Ransburgh, of Frederick county, for the sum of three thousand pounds current money, bearing date the 24th day of September 1779.
