His Excellency communicates to the president sundry letters from Messieurs Hanbury, Groves, and Russell, and from Mr. Carmichael, with a protest on the bills drawn on the Bank of England, by an act passed last session; which were read, and sent to the house of delegates by Upton Sheredine, Esq;
