The engrossed bills No. 26, 27, 28, 29, and 30, were read, assented to, and the paper bills thereof so endorsed, were sent to the house of delegates by William Hemsley, Esq; Messieurs Shaw and Duckett, from the house of delegates, deliver to the president the engrossed bills No. 31, 32, 33, with the paper bills thereof, which engrossed bills were severally endorsed; "By the house of delegates, January 27, 1781: Read and assented to."

On reading the bill, entitled, An act to continue the act to prohibit the exportation of grain, wheat, &c. in progression, the question was put, That a general embargo be continued until the 20th April, or until the governor and council are satisfied the one half of the flour required by congress from this state is procured, and that then a general exportation may take place by land and by water? Carried in the negative.
