BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, JUNE 20, 1781.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOURS,

**W**E agree to the proposition made by your message of yesterday, to separate the form of association from that of the subscription, that each stand unconnected with the other, and that each associator be left to his own will as to the sum or proportion of his property which such associator shall agree to receive and pay into the treasury, to discharge him from his association, and send your honours the form of subscription agreed upon by this house.

On the fullest consideration of the part of your message respecting the bills now in the office, we are of opinion, that the inconveniences which will arise from making use of those bills, will greatly exceed any advantage from the dispatch which would be occasioned by it.

**W**E promise to become subscribers of the sums affixed to our names, on the scheme for an emission, in pursuance of the act for the emission of bills of credit not exceeding two hundred thousand pounds, on the security of double the value in lands, to defray the expences of the present campaign.

**W**E engage on our honour to receive at par, from associators, the bills of credit of the new proposed emission, on all transactions past and future, rating silver dollars at seven shillings and six-pence, until such time as we shall have carried into the treasury to the amount of the proportion of the valuation of our property within this state by the assessors, or sum affixed to our names, or until such time as we shall have received to that amount, not having had a reasonable time to carry the same in as aforesaid.
