Thomas Sim Lee, Esq; is proposed to be balloted for by this house.

By order, Which was read; and the following message in answer thereto, with a letter from general Washington, respecting general Smallwood's remaining in this state, in answer to one written the General during last session, was sent to the house of delegates by Matthew Tilghman, Esq;

BY THE SENATE, NOVEMBER 19, 1781.

GENTLEMEN, THOUGH a meeting of this house was prevented by the same cause which occasioned a want of members to constitute a house of delegates, we perfectly concur in sentiment with you, that the general assembly now met ought to elect a governor and council by joint ballot as foon

We are ready immediately to ballot for a governor, and agree to join in electing a council tomorrow at twelve o'clock. Richard Barnes and Edward Lloyd, Esquires, are appointed by this,

to join the gentlemen nominated by your house in examining the ballot boxes.

No gentleman is named in this house for governor in addition to the gentleman named by you. By order,

The members of the senate having severally qualified in the presence of each other, by taking the oaths prescribed by the form of government, proceeded to ballot for a governor; the ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up, and delivered to the committee, appointed by this house to join the committee of the house of delegates, to take the joint ballot of both houses, who retired to the conference room, and after some time returned and reported, that Thomas Sim Lee had every vote. Whereupon it is declared in the senate, That Thomas Sim Lee is unanimously elected governor of the state of Maryland.
