"That the precedence of the senators elected by the electors of the senate be regulated according to the order in which they stand in the report of the committee appointed to examine the proceedings of the electors of the fenate, and that fenators hereafter elected by the fenates be considered as junior to the present senators, and their precedence be according to their respe priority of election into the senate." And the eighth; on which the question being put, the senate were equally divided.

The senate adjourns till to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.
