ORDERED, That Thomas Stone and Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Esquires, wait on the house of delegates, and inform them, that the governor is now ready in the senate to sign and seal the engrossed bills passed this session.

The house of delegates appeared, and the following engrossed bills were signed, and the great seal affixed thereto in the presence of both houses.

No. 4. An act to raise the supplies for the year seventeen hundred and eighty-two.

No. 5. An act for the trial and punishment of spies.

No. 6. An act to make valid a deed from Lemuel Cravath to Nathaniel Ramsey.
