On motion, RESOLVED, That a letter be written by the president of the senate and speaker of the house of delegates, to the deputies from congress, advising them, that the earliest consideration will be given to the several important subjects contained in their communication to the committee of both houses.

The bill, entitled, An act to postpone the sale of certain confiscated British property for the redemption of certificates, was read the second time by especial order, passed with the proposed amendment, and sent to the house of delegates, with the above resolution, by James M'Henry, Esq;

Amendment proposed. After the word "sale," in the 14th line, insert, "provided that the sale of the said manors shall not be postponed or delayed beyond the tenth day of November next."
