Amendment proposed. At the end of the bill insert the following clause: "Provided that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the right of the said Ariana Kennedy in case she shall survive the said Patrick Kennedy, or the right or rights of any other person or persons, by, from, or under, the said Ariana Kennedy."

The fenate adjourns till to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

HE senate met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, An act for vesting an estate for life in Ariana Kennedy, and an sestate in see simple in John Lynch and Mary his wife, in the property therein mentioned, was sent to the house of delegates by James Millenry, Esq.

The bill, entitled, An act to empower Catherine Woolsey to sell the real estate of George Woolsey, her late husband, &c. was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendment. Strike out from the word "with" in the 5th line from the bottom of the 4th page, to the word "one" in the 3d line inclusive.

The bill, entitled, An act to repeal certain duties, was read the second time, passed, and, with the above bill, sent to the house of delegates by Charles Carroll, Barrister, Esq;

Matthew Tilghman, Esq; delivers to the president the sollowing dissent to the act empowering congress to lay a duty of five per cent. on imports:

Dissentient.

BECAUSE by the bill, congress are vested, con rary to our form of government, with legislative authority, and with powers inconsistent with the second article of our bill of rights, which declares, that the people of this state ought to have the sole and exclusive right of regulating the internal government and police thereof, powers which so manifestly alter our constitution, that the bill ought, in our opinion, to have passed in the mode prescribed by the fifty-ninth article of the soum of government, and been left to the people for their consideration.

BECAUSE we see, with painful humiliation, in derogation of our sovereignty, powers are to be exercised and officers to be appointed, over whom the supreme authority of the state will have no controul; officers, whose illegal and oppressive acts must remain uncurbed by our laws, and whose insults on a degraded people must be borne with a tame and disgraceful submission.

BECAUSE a grant of fuch magnitude, for so great a length of time, particularly buthensome to the state, unequal on individuals, and accompanied with such extensive powers, has a manifest tendency towards the establishment of an evergrown and dangerous power, may produce a contrariety of interest between congress and the several states, may disturb the peace and happiness of America, raise disquietude, distrust, and jealousy, in the minds of the people, and, in the end, prove the unhappy source of dissurion and separation.
