The honourable George Plater, Esq; not being able to attend, the senate proceeded to ballot for a president; on examination of the ballot box it appeared, that the honourable Matthew Tilghman, Esq; has a majority of votes; whereupon he took the chair.

A petition from Philip Hall, of Baltimore-town, praying that the commissioners of Baltimore-town might be directed to survey and add to the town, a piece of land adjoining thereto—A petition from the executors and children of John Cornthwaite, praying that the will of the said Cornthwaite might be rendered valid—A petition from sundry the inhabitants of Baltimore-town, praying that the market-house of Baltimore-town might be fixed at Light-lane—were severally read, referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent by Richard Barnes, Esq;

James M^rHenry, Esq; brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act to punish the counterfeiting continental bank bills; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

William Hindman, Esq; brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act to enable the visitors of Talbot county school to sell the lands belonging to the said school; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
