By THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, JANUARY 11, 1783.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be, and is hereby directed, to receive the bills of credit emitted by the act, entitled, An act for the emission of bills of credit not exceeding two hundred thousand pounds, on the security of double the value in lands, to defray the expences of the present campaign, for all British property sold for the redemption of the said bills, at par with specie.
