The additional supplement to the act to settle and adjust the accounts of the troops of this state in the service of the United States, and for other purposes, was read the first time and ordered

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOURS, WE have returned the bill, entitled, an act appointing wardens for the port of Baltimoretown, in Baltimore county, with a negative, on account of the regulations therein contained relative to pilots and pilotage, which we do not approve, for many reasons; amongst others, we think the whole business relative to that subject ought to be put under the control of the executive, by an act of the general affembly, that would comprehend all other ports in this state, as well as the port of Baltimore. We have not now time to prepare such act. If your honours think the other parts of the bill ought to be enacted into a law, relative to wardens, and their duties respecting wharves and other particulars confined to the harbour or bason of Bal imoretown, this house will agree to leave out the parts relative to pilots and pilotage, and pais the remainder.
