

SUNDAY, June 1, 1783.

THE senate met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The resolution on the petition of William Read was read and assented to.

The bill for the payment of the journal of accounts was read the second time by especial order and will pass.

The bill for the enlargement of the market-house in Baltimore-town, was read the second time and will not pass.

The engrossed bills No. 32, 33, and 34, were read and assented to, and sent to the house of delegates, with the paper bills thereof—the resolution on the petition of John Beale Howard and others—the resolution referring the resolution of congress and letter from the superintendent of the finance to the intendant of the revenue—the resolution upon the petition of William Read—the resolution respecting executions against purchasers of British property—the bill to empower Nicholas Carroll and James Carroll to lease certain lands therein mentioned—the bill for the payment of the journal of accounts—the bill for the enlargement of the market-house in Baltimore-town—and the following messages—by James M'Henry, Esq;

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, MAY 31, 1783.

On considering the letter from the superintendent of the finances of the United States, of the 27th of February last, informing that he had nominated Mr. James Nourse as commissioner (to succeed Mr. Daniel Defaussure, who had resigned) to settle the accounts between this state and the United States, and to liquidate certificates and other claims by citizens of this state against the United States, agreeably to the resolve of congress of the 20th of February, 1782, and requesting the approbation of the legislature of the said commissioner for the purpose aforesaid: **RESOLVED**, That the general assembly approve of the appointment of the said Mr. James Nourse, and do direct the intendant of the revenue and the auditor-general, treasurer, and all other officers of this government, to furnish the said commissioner with accounts, vouchers, and all other things necessary to enable him to state and adjust the accounts of this state with the United States.

Messieurs Keene and Wheeler, from the house of delegates, deliver to the president the following resolution:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, JUNE 1, 1783.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council, until some further provision can be made agreeably to the requisition of congress, be authorized and empowered to direct, that provisions and hospital stores be provided for the sick and wounded soldiers that may be in, or may come to, this state, belonging to the line of said state, or any detached corps; and that the intendant of the revenue be directed to supply such sum or sums of money as may be necessary for that purpose, and charge the same to the United States.
