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By a letter from the chevalier d'Anmours, and a certificate from his Excellency the chevalier de la Luzerne, communicated by his Excellency the Governor to the conferees, it appears that fome wines imported for the use of his Excellency the French minister's houshold, have paid duties amounting to I. 16 10. From the certificate above mentioned it also appears, that all articles imported for the use and consumption of the minister of the United States to the court of Versailles, are exempted from all duties; and the conferrees conclude, that the same exemptions should be granted to the ministers of France and all foreign ministers, and that the general assembly should request the governor and council to direct the naval officer to repay the duties. collected on the wines imported by Messieurs Montbog and Latil, for the use of the minister of France, amounting, as above mentioned, to the fum of f. 16 10.

All which is humbly submitted to the consideration of the senate.
