

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER 1784. 11

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Joseph Cresap, of Washington county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by Samuel Hughes, Esq;

Mr. Sellars, from the house of delegates, delivers to the president the following resolutions:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 6, 1784.

RESOLVED, That the intendant of the revenue be authorized and directed to pay the interest due to the first day of November last, on certificates liquidated agreeably to the act of May 1781, to adjust the debts due from this state.

RESOLVED, That the intendant of the revenue be authorized and directed to pay the interest due to the first day of November last, on certificates issued agreeably to the act of November session 1782, proposing to the citizens of this state, creditors of congress on loan-office certificates, to accept this state for payment on the terms therein mentioned.

RESOLVED, That the intendant of the revenue be authorized and directed to pay the subscribers for the bills of credit issued in 1781 (vulgarly called red money) the principal and interest due them, unless they will take certificates for the principal at six per cent. in which case certificates may issue to them as to other creditors of the public.

The bill, entitled, An act to confirm in Amos Garrett a title to a tract of land called Hazard Enlarged, was read the second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by George Gale, Esq;

James M<sup>r</sup>Henry, Esq; appeared in the senate, and after qualifying in the usual mode, as directed by the form of government, took his seat.

The bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, an act for an election to determine at what place the court-house and prison of Harford county should be built, was read the second time by especial order with the proposed amendment and will pass.

Amendment proposed. In the fifteenth line after the word "have" insert "or ought to have."

Thomas Stone, Esq; appeared in the senate, and after qualifying in the usual mode, as directed by the form of government, took his seat.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Mary Crudginton and Elizabeth Topping, was read the second time by especial order and will pass.

The following resolution, with the above bills, was sent to the house of delegates by John Henry, Esq;

BY THE SENATE, DECEMBER 7, 1784.

RESOLVED, That the president of the senate, and the speaker of the house of delegates, write joint letters to the gentlemen chosen delegates to represent this state in congress, not members of the general assembly, informing them, that their attendance in congress is immediately necessary: and that they forward the letters to the several gentlemen by express, to obtain their answers by the return of the express, signifying when they will attend congress, it being the intention of the general assembly to have an immediate representation.
