The house of delegates appeared in the senate, and the following engrossed bills were presented by the speaker to his excellency the governor, who signed the same, and affixed the great seal thereto, in presence of the members of both houses.

No. 1. An act to appoint a trustee to take care of the person and property of George Shipley, senior, who is insane.

No. 2. An act to establish a market at the market-house in Chester-town, in Kent county, and for the regulation of the said market.

No. 3. An act to direct the recording a deed from John Birkhead and Anne his wife, to Richard Chew, of Anne-Arundel county.

No. 4. A bill, entitled, An act to establish a road in Worcester county, from the Sinepuxent road, to Walton Purnell and Annanias Hodson's grist-mill, and from thence to Freeman's Branch.

No. 5. An act to confirm a deed of bargain and sale made by John Cannon and Anne Cannon his wife, to Sarah Piner, of and in the lands and premises therein mentioned.

No. 6. An act respecting the marriage of Henry Dickinson, of Caroline county.

No. 7. An act to provide a permanent fund for the further encouragement and establishment of Washington college.

No. 8. An act to confirm in Amos Garrett a title to a tract of land called Hazard Enlarged.

No. 9. An act for the relief of Mary Cruogington and Elizabeth Topping.

No. 10. A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act for an election to determine at what place the court-house and prison of Harford county should be built.

No. 11. An act for the benefit of Isabella Alexander and her children.

No. 12. An act to naturalize major-general the marquis de la Fayette and his heirs male forever.

No. 13. An act for the relief of Joseph Cresap, of Washington county.

No. 14. An act to confirm the title of Edward Lloyd in and to a tract of land in Talbot county, called Soldiers Delight.

No. 15. An act to prevent the obstruction of the navigation of the eastern and north-west branches of the river Patowmack.

No. 16. An act to ascertain, establish, and perpetuate, the bounds of the public grounds at Queen's-town.

No. 17. An act to empower the justices of Montgomery county to assess and levy a sum of money on the inhabitants of said county, for the purposes therein mentioned.

No. 18. A bill, entitled, An act for underpinning and arching the court-house of Baltimore county, in Baltimore town, and the extension of Calvert street.

No. 19. An act for the sale of the glebe land of Saint Mary Anne's parish, in Cecil county.

No. 20. An act to invest James Rumsfy with an exclusive privilege and benefit of making and selling new invented boats, on a model by him invented.

No. 21. An act for recording a deed, executed by Samuel Ervin, Mary Ervin, and William Ervin, to William Rogers, of Cecil county.

No. 22. An act to enable Edward Lloyd, Esquire, to record a deed from James and Blaney Edmondson to Edward Lloyd, Esquire, deceased, for a tract of land called Addition.

No. 23. An act to authorise the delegates of this state in congress to consent to an alteration in the eighth of the articles of the confederation, and in its place to subscribe and ratify another.

No. 24. An act for recording a deed from James Rumsfy to John Carnan, of Cecil county.
