M O N D A Y, November 28, 1785.

THE senate met. Present as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The president lays before the senate a petition from Thomas Russell and William Augustine Washington, respecting the second sale of the Kingsberry furnace; and a memorial from the tradesmen, manufacturers, and others, of the town of Baltimore, respecting the importation of foreign goods, and the encouragement of American manufactures; which were severally read, referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and, with the letter from the intendant, enclosing several letters from Matthew Ridley, Esq; the petition of James Henry, and the petition of Mary Hilliary, sent by William Per y, Esq;

The bill, entitled, A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act for founding a college on the western shore of this state, and constituting the same, together with Washington college on the eastern shore, into one university, by the name of The University of Maryland, was read the second time and will pass.

Thomas Stone, Esq; brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An additional Supplement to the act, entitled, An act for founding a college on the western shore of this state, and constituting the same, together with Washington college on the eastern shore, into one university, by the name of The University of Maryland; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The president lays before the senate a letter from his excellency the governor, enclosing several letters from the secretary of congress, with the journals of congress for the last year, and several resolves of congress, and a letter from J. Pierce, with a resolve of congress; which were severally read, referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent by Thomas Stone, Esq;

Thomas Stone, Esq; brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act for enlarging the power of the high court of chancery; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The president lays before the senate a petition from Thomas Lane Emory and Thomas Carradine, praying to be relieved from the interest due on the loan of a sum of paper money borrowed under the proprietary government; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

Mr. Goldsborough, from the house of delegates, delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act to establish permanent salaries for the chancellor and the judges, endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 25, 1785: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The president lays before the senate a petition from Robert Lemmon, and a petition from a number of the inhabitants and others on the reserve lands in Baltimore county, praying that the said Robert Lemmon may be appointed surveyor of the said reserves; which were read, referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent by Richard Barnes, Esq;
