Mr. Fraizer, from the house of delegates, delivers to the president the following resolution:

By THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES; DECEMBER 31, 1785.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be authorized and directed to pay Alexander Contee Hanson, Esquire, or his order, the sum of seven hundred and twenty-five pounds current money, for his trouble in preparing for publication the laws of this state from the year seventeen hundred and sixty-three to the present time, he having undertaken the said public work at the request of the general assembly.

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The president lays before the senate a memorial and representation of John Steret, and Co. agents and attorneys for Nicholas and Jacob Van Staphorsts, respecting certain tobacco due on the loan negotiated by Matthew Rieley with the said Nicholas and Jacob Van Staphorsts; a petition from John Hamilton, praying compensation for his services as deputy commissioner; a memorial of Walter Dulany, praying to be entitled to all the privileges of a citizen of this state; a petition of John Beale Bordley, Nathan Hammond, and William Paca, respecting certain lots in the city of Annapolis; and a petition from a number of inhabitants of Baltimore and Harford counties, respecting the post road; which were severally read, referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent by George Gale, Esq;

The president lays before the senate a petition from John Fitch, praying the advance of a sum of money, to purchase a steam engine; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The resolution respecting Alexander Contee Hanson, Esq; was read the second time by especial order and unanimously assented to.

The resolution respecting Jesse Suit, was read the second time, dissented to, and sent with the above petition and resolution to the house of delegates, by James Lloyd, Esq;

On motion, That a committee be appointed to state to the house of delegates the opinion of the senate, that the salaries allowed by the bill, entitled, An act to establish permanent salaries for the chancellor and the judges, and the bill to ascertain and establish a permanent salary to the governor, are too low; and to request a reconsideration of the subject, and an augmentation of these salaries; also, that all the unappropriated revenues of the state be mortgaged to pay the salaries; also, to state the impropriety of the clause in the civil list bill, wherein the expectation of the assembly is expressed, that not more than three members of congress should attend at one and the same time, and to request that this part of the bill be struck out; and also to state the propriety of preparing and forwarding the supply bill, and other essential business: RESOLVED, That Thomas Stone, Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, and George Gale, Esquires, be a committee for the same.

The senate adjourns till to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.
