true intent and meaning of this act, Be it enacted, that where any timber frames, or logs joined and confected rogether, and forming the interior lines, boundaries or facings, of such wharfs, have been carried into the water, in order that the space contained and included within the said frames or logs hereafter may be filled up with brush, stone, wood, rubbish and earth, the said wharfs shall be deemed and taken to be so far completed and finished as to take away from the wardens aforesaid the power to direct of what materials and in what manner the said whars shall be constructed, and to limit and shorten their present extension into the water, and the owner or owners thereof shall not be subject to any fine or fines to be imposed by the mayor, recorder, aldermen, and common council, for any thing done in the premites, as being contrary to this Provided nevertheless, that if the frames or logs aforesaid shall not be so closely united and joined together, as to prevent the earth carried into the space included as aforesaid from being w. shed out between the logs and timbers of the frames aforesaid, and from being drifted into the port in such manner as to obstruct or endanger the navigation thereof, the wardens aforesaid shall have full powers and authority to direct the owner or owners of fuch wharfs, to make the frames thereof fo tight, compact and close, as to prevent the earth from being washed out and drifted as aforesaid, and if they shall neglect or resuse to comply with the direction and order of the said wardens, for the space of eight weeks after the same have been duly notified unto them, in that case fuch owner or owners shall forseit and pay such fine or fines as may be imposed by the mayor, recorder, and a dermen, or any other person, for contravening the provision of this act."
