BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, FEBRUARY 9, 1786.

Whereas, by a resolve of the general assembly passed at April session 1783, Messieurs Thomas Beatty, Joseph Sprigg, Andrew Bruce, David Poe, George Keeports, and Robert Long, were appointed commissioners to lay out a common highway or road, on as streight a line as the country would permit, from Baltimore-town to Elizabeth-town in Washington county, and from thence to the westernmost part of the state, any three of whom were smpowered to act: And whereas it appears to this general assembly, that three of the said commissioners, to wit, Thomas Beatty, David Poe and Robert Long, attended severally twenty-five days in the execution of the faid duty, and have laid out, and returned a plat and report of, a road from Bastim re-town to Elizabeth-town in Washington county, in the manner required by the aforesaid resolve; that the said comm stioners contracted with Mr. Biggar Head, as surveyor, at 18s per day, who, at the request and with the approbation of the said commissioners, contracted with two chain carriers, at 7/6 per day each; that the said surveyor attended sity-one days, and the said chain carriers each forty-eight days: And whereas the said commissioners ought to receive a compensation for their services, and the expence of a fu veyor and chain carriers as aforefaid ought to be paid by the public; RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the Western-shore be, and he is hereby authorised and circled, to pay to Mr. Biggar Head, or his order, the sum of forty-sive pounds eighteen shillings current money, for his attendan e as surveyor, agreeably to his contract with the said commissioners; as also the further sum of thirty-six pounds, being the amount of the money by him agreed to be paid to his chain carriers as aforesaid; and that the said Thomas Beatty, David Poe, and Robert Long, be allowed fifteen shillings for every day they attended as commissioners under the asoresaid resolve, which the said treasurer is hereby authorised to pay to them, or their orders.
