Page 4. In the 3d line after the word "be," strike out to the end of the clause, and insert "and the said books shall always be open to the inspection and examination of the said commissioners." At the end of the bill insert, "And be it enacted, That the said commissioners, or a majority of them, and their successors, for ever, shall have full power and authority to make such rules, regulations and orders, for the good government of the said town, as they from time to time may think proper, and also to fix a market or markets in the said town, and to make regulations for the same, such rules, orders or regulations, not being contrary to the constitution or laws of this state."
