Same page, 2d line from bottom, after the word " oath," infert " or affirmation, as the case may be." Page 7, 1st line, after the word "oath," insert " or affirmation, as the case may be." Page 8, Ist line, after the word "oath," infert "or affirmation, as the case may be." Same page, line 6, 7, and 9, after word "oath," insert "or affirmation, as the case may be." At the end of the bill add, "and provided also, that all accounts for any sum not exceeding thirty pounds current money in the course of any whole year, and proved agreeably to the Aid act, may be evidence as before the passing this act until the first day of January seventeen hundred and eighty nine, and after that time, any account not exceeding ten pounds current money in the course of any whole year, may be proved and received in evidence as aforesaid? Whereas by the humble petition of John Petty, of the city of London, merchant, it appears to this general affembly, that he is liable and answerable for the payment of certain duties bonded for by Thomas Rutland, and that he hath no means of discharging the same without dup ,fing of certain effects made over and affigued him by the said Rutland, an immediate saie of which will be particularly injurious to him the faid fletty, and fuch as are creditors of the said Rutland, RESOLVED, That the naval officer of the third district is hereby authorised and directed, to grant an indulgence to the faid Petty, for the payment of the aforefaid duties, until the first day of June seventeen hundred and eighty-six, provided the said Petty gives bond, with such security as the naval officer shall approve, for the full amount of all duties due by the said Rutland to this state, with interest for the same until paid.
