The senate assumed the consideration of the bill, entitled, A supplement to the act for the further relief of the securities of Thomas Williams, deceased, late collector of the tax and public dues in Prince-George's county, and for other purposes therein mentioned, which was read the second time,

and the following amendments being propoted and agreed to.

Amendments proposed. At the end of the bill, in the second page, after the word "money," insert "or certificates. And it is hereby declared to be the true intent and meaning of the act, for the further relief of the securities of Thomas Williams, deceased, late collector of the tax and public dues in Prince-George's county, and for other purposes therein mentioned, that persons indebted for taxes to be collected by the said securities, have a right and election to pay such certificates or bills of credit for the faid taxes as the faid fecurities have a right to pay into the treasury; and if any property is taken by the faid fecurities and fold, it shall be upon the terms of paying in money or certificates aforesaid to the amount of the sum due to the said securities, and the residue, if any, in money, to the owners of the property taken; and if any property already taken and not fold, or if fold and purchased by the securities, or any of them, or any person for them, may be redeemed by paying certificates or bills of credit as aforesaid, or by lodging bonds as aforesaid on or before the first day of March next.

"And be it enacted, That any bond given under this act, shall be a lien upon the lands of the

obligors from the date of the bond."

The president lays before the senate a memorial from Matthew Ridley, praying that a committee may be appointed to report on his conduct in negotiating the loan with Nicholas and Jacob Vanstaphors, and that the committee may be empowered to allow him the usual commission for executing such kind of business; which was read, referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and, with the above bill, was sent by Samuel Hughes, Esquire.

The senate assumed the consideration of the bill to direct descents; which was read the second time.
