

ing the said road through their land, that it shall and may be lawful for any justice of the peace for Anne-Arundel county, on application for that purpose by any person interested, to issue his warrant under hand and seal, directed to any constable of said county, commanding him to summon five freeholders to appear on a day by him to be appointed on the land aforesaid, who on oath shall estimate and value the said damages, and return the same to the said justice of the peace aforesaid; which valuation so made and returned, shall be conclusive, and the party or parties in whose favour the said valuation shall be made, shall be entitled to receive the same from the said commissioners, and."

The bill, entitled, An act for quieting the estate of William Carmichael in Rousby's Recovery, and confirming his title to the same; was read the second time by especial order, passed with the proposed amendments, and, with the above bill, and the resolution respecting William Frisby and Sarah Hanson, was sent to the house of delegates by Edward Lloyd, Esquire.

Amendments proposed. In the eighth line of the first page, strike out "Mr." and insert "the said James." In the fifth line from the bottom of the second page, strike out "Mr." and insert "the said James." At the end of the bill insert "on his the said William Carmichael's repaying to the treasurer of the western shore the commission, if any, and all other expences incurred by the state in the disposition and sale of the said property made on behalf of the state."

On motion, RESOLVED, That Richard Ridgely, Esquire, be added to the conferees on the subject of relief to private debtors.
