THE senate met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The president lays before the senate a letter from his excellency the governor, enclosing a letter from the secretary of congress, containing a letter from the president, and several resolutions of congress, recommending the propriety of passing a law to repeal all such acts, or parts of acts, as are repugnant to the treaty of peace between the United States and his Britannic majesty; which were severally read the first time.

On motion to appoint a committee to prepare a bill correspondent to the recommendation of the said letter and resolutions of congress, RESOLVED, That George Gale, Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, and John Hall, Esquires, be a committee for the same.

George Gale, Esquire, from the said committee, brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act to repeal all the acts, or parts of acts, of assembly of this state, which are repugnant to the treaty of peace between the United States of America and his Britannic majesty; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, the said letter and resolutions of congress were read the second time.

The bill, entitled, An act to repeal all the acts, or parts of acts, of assembly of this state, which are repugnant to the treaty of peace between the United States of America and his Britannic majesty, was read the second time by especial order, unanimously assented to, endorsed will pass, and, with the above letter and resolutions, was sent to the house of delegates by Peregrine Tilghman, Esquire.

The president lays before the senate a petition from Simon Nicholls, praying that certain securities may be accepted by the treasurer; also a petition from Robert Peacock, praying for the restoration of, or compensation for, certain confiscated property; and also a petition from John Troup, respecting certain land lying within the limits of Talbot-town; which were severally read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The bill, entitled, An act to invest Sarah Marshall with power to convey the land therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and, with the above petitions, was sent to the house of delegates by George Gale, Esquire.

The president lays before the senate a memorial from Matthew Tilghman and John Gordon, praying that they may be empowered to convey in trust certain lands to the commissioners of the poor of Talbot county for the use of the said poor; which was read, and leave given to bring in a bill pursuant to the prayer thereof.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Solomon Clayton, register of wills for Queen-Anne's county, was read the second time by especial order and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act to prevent the exportation of unmerchantable tobacco, was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. In the fifth line, from the bottom of the first page, after the word "tobacco," strike out the interlineation and insert "subject to the usual deduction of six per cent. when paid or received in lieu of crop tobacco, and of ten per cent. when paid or received in lieu of crop tobacco clear of cask, according to the terms and intention of the contract, judgment or decree, as the case may be."
