The president then informed the senate, that previous to their meeting on this day, he had, upon the application of a gentleman for that purpole, given a certificate, that no such petition had ever been handed into the senate, and to prevent any subsequent imputation, requested, that it might be remembered by the gentlemen of the senate, that this certificate was given, in point of time, previous to the appearance of the petition in the senate.

The senate being of opinion, that, on consideration of all circumstances, it would be more prudent to adopt the faid resolutions, than by adhering to their own, run the hazard of protracting the session, by engaging in a conference or a train of mellaging with the other house on the subject,

The bill, entitled, An act to compel the attendance of the members of the general assembly, was

read the second time, and, on motion, committed for amendment.

RESOLVED, ThatGeorge Gale, Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, and William Hemsley, Esquires, be a committee for the same. The senate adjourns till Monday morning 9 o'clock.

N D A Y, December 3, 1787.

HE senate met. Present as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. The president lays before the senate a letter from his excellency the governor, enclosing a letter from the board of treasury, enclosing the requisition of the United States in congress for the present year, together with a statement of arrears, computed to the 30th of June last; which were severally read, reserred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent by John Hall, Esquire,

The senate assumed the consideration of the order of the day, and after qualifying as directed by the constitution and form of government, proceeded to the election of a member to fill up the vacancy occasioned by the death of the late honourable-Thomas Stone, Esquire. The ballot-box was preparell, the ballots deposited therein, and on examination thereof it appeared, that Richard Potts, Esquire, had a majority of votes. Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that the honourable Richard Potts, Esquire, is duly elected a member thereof.
