BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 1, 1788.

RESOLVED, That the auditor-general be authorized, on application of Samuel Groom Osborne, to pass upon the two certificates following, to wit, one granted to John Swineyard Whitaker for one horse valued at thirty-five pounds, dated the fourteenth of August, seventeen hundred and eighty-one, by Alexander Craufurd, collector of horses; and one other granted to Freeborn Brown for one horse valued at forty-five pounds, dated the fourteenth of August, seventeen hundred and eighty-one, by the said Alexander, and the balance due on the said certificates to liquidate, adjust, and certify to the treasurer, as fully as he might have done if the time limited by law for the said purpose had not expired; and the treasurer of the western shore is hereby required to grant a certificate to the said Samuel Groom Osborne for the sum so certified by the auditor, in the same manner as if the time limited as aforesaid had not yet expired.

We have appointed George Gale and Daniel Carroll, Esquires, to join the gentlemen nominated by your house to examine the ballot boxes, and agree immediately to go into the appointment of three delegates for the ensuing year.
