The senate met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Esquire, appeared in the senate.

Mr. Banckes, from the house of delegates, delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act to provide for the collection of taxes due in Anne Arundel county, and for other purposes, endorsed. By the house of delegates, December 19, 1788: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

By the house of delegates, December 20, 1788: Read the second time by especial order and will pass. And also a bill, entitled, An act to empower the governor and council to compound with the dissenters of British property, and for other purposes, endorsed.

Whereas it appears to the general assembly, that Samuel Thomas, late collector of taxes in Talbot county, and William Banckes, late collector of taxes in Caroline county, have paid to the treasurer the full amount of the taxes to be by them collected in their respective counties; That the said Samuel Thomas and William Banckes be and they are hereby discharged from all interest due on arrears of taxes; provided, that if the said Samuel Thomas and William Banckes, or either of them, have received any interest on taxes from any person or persons of their respective counties, he or they shall return the same to the person or persons from whom it was received.
