THE senate met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The honourable Daniel Bowley, Esquire, appeared in the senate, and after taking the oaths required by the constitution and form of government, and subscribing his declaration of belief in the christian religion, and also by taking the oath for the support of the government of the United States, took his seat.
