By THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 12, 1790.

Whereas it appears from the muster rolls of the Maryland line, that there is a considerable sum due to non-commissioned officers and soldiers, the time for granting the depreciation of pay by the auditor general having expired, and justice requiring that faithful services should not go unrewarded, therefore, RESOLVED, That the auditor, under the directions of the governor and council, be and he is hereby directed to examine the musters of the Maryland line, and other documents that may be produced, and liquidate the depreciation on the pay of, and grant certificates to, all non-commissioned officers and soldiers, or their legal representatives, for what may appear to be justly due to them, agreeable to the regulations heretofore established; provided that application be made by the first day of November next; and that the auditor give at least six weeks public notice of this indulgence in the Annapolis, Baltimore, and Easton news-papers.
