THE senate met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill to alter and change the name of Charles Ridgely Carnan, and others, according to the will of captain Charles Ridgely, of Baltimore county, deceased, was read the second time by special order, and the question was put, That the said bill do pass? RESOLVED, That the purchasers of Ebenezer Mackie's confiscated property be released therefrom, and that the said property be restored to the said Ebenezer Mackie in the same manner as if it never had been confiscated; and that the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby directed to deliver to the said Mackie his bond now in the office for one third of said property, purchased by him at a resale, on condition that the said Mackie pay to the treasurer aforesaid the amount of all expences which this state may have incurred by reason of the confiscation, sale and resale, of the said property, and all expences incurred by the state in any suit or suits at law, or in equity, on account of the said property.
