By THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 3, 1790.

RESOLVED, That no execution shall issue against any public debtor who has installed, or had liberty to install by the law passed the last session of assembly, until the end of this session.

The resolution respecting John O'Donnell, was read the second time and assented to; which, with the resolution in favour of Samuel Chase, the resolution in favour of John Bean, the resolution in favour of Philip Casson, the resolution respecting John Tomlinson, and the bill, entitled, A Supplement to the act, entitled, An act to provide for the appointment of commissioners for the regulation and improvement of Easton, in Talbot county, and to establish and regulate a market at the said town, was sent to the house of delegates by Charles Carroll, Esquire.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY, December 4, 1790.

THE senate met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolution respecting Joshua Beall, was read the second time and dissented to; and the following message upon the subject thereof, was prepared and agreed to.

By THE SENATE, DECEMBER 4, 1790.

GENTLEMEN,

WE have dissented to the resolution proposing to empower the auditor, under the direction of the governor and council, to liquidate the account between the state and Joshua Beall, of Prince-George's county. The principles upon which this account must be settled, appear so obvious, that we apprehend that the treasurer can be at no difficulty in ascertaining the balance due from Mr. Beall to the state. To remove, however, all doubt upon cases of this nature, we take the liberty to forward a statement of the claims existing in this instance, which appears to us to be just and reasonable; and if the statement should meet your approbation, a certified copy of it can be lodged in the treasury, as a guide to be observed upon similar occasions.
