RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the eastern shore do retain in his hands, out of the money appropriated to the use of Washington college, the sum of sixty pounds seven shillings and six-pence, and pay the same to colonel William Richardson, executor of Henry Dickinson, in lieu of the like sum stolen out of the said treasury in the lifetime of the said Henry Dickinson, and part of the funds of the said college.

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act to make better provision for the appointment and qualification of constables, was read the second time and will pass.

The bill, entitled, An act to alter the second, fifteenth and twenty-sixth sections of the constitution of this state, and to disqualify members of congress from holding a seat in the legislature or executive of this state, was read the second time, and the question was put, That the said bill do pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

A F F I R M A T I V E.

The honourable William Perry, John Smith, Richard Ridgely, and Daniel Bowley, Esquires.

N E G A T I V E.

The honourable George Plater, Esquire, president, the honourable John Henry, George Gale, Charles Carroll, Daniel Carroll, James Carroll, and Nicholas Hammond, Esquires.

So it was determined in the negative.

Which two last mentioned bills, with the resolutions respecting Elizabeth Dorsey, executrix of Thomas Dorsey, deceased, were sent to the house of delegates by James Carroll, Esquire.

The bill, entitled, An act to allow the proprietors of the Susquehanna Canal a further time to complete the same, and to extend the number of shares to thirty shares, was read the second time by especial order and will pass with the following amendment:

Amendment proposed. At the end of the bill insert the following clause: "And be it enacted, That any alien, foreigner or foreigners, may purchase in and hold a share or shares in the said corporation in as full and ample a manner as if he or they were citizens of the state of Maryland at the time of making such purchase, and may continue to hold the same notwithstanding his or their residence in a foreign country.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

THE senate met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, A Supplement to the act to prevent the exportation of bread and flour not merchantable, and for other purposes, was read the second time, passed, and with the bill allowing the proprietors of the Susquehanna Canal a further time to complete the same, and to extend the number of shares to thirty shares, was sent to the house of delegates by Nicholas Hammond, Esquire.
