Amendments proposed. After the word "discharge" in the 8th line of the third page, infert "Be it further enacted, That the state agent be empowered to allow the several collectors credit foramount of all sums charged against them as arise from property belonging to subjects of the king of France, and exempted by law from taxation.

"Be it further enacted, That the faid agent shall have power to compound with Isaac Redgrave and the securities of Thomas Boyer, of Kent county, and Samuel Groome Osborne, of Harford county, for the balances by them respectively due, upon such terms as he may think most for the in-

terest of the state. "Be it further enacted, That the said agent be authorised and directed to collect all duties, fines, forfeitures and amerciaments, due from the theriffs of the several counties in this state, and also all sums

An ACT respecting the bank stock. BE it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the governor and the council of this Rate for the time being, shall have full power and authority to nominate and appoint one or more fit and proper person or persons, residing in the city of London, to receive from the state agent the bank stock, whenever the same shall be recovered, and the state agent is hereby authorised and directed to pay to fuch person or persons, so to be nominated and appointed by the governor and council, the amount fuch bank stock so to be recovered and received by him, after deducting his commission.

Be it further enacted, That the governor and the council shall and may, in their discretion, direct such person or persons, by them to be appointed, to sell and dispose of the said bank stock, and the monies arising from the sale thereof, to hold in his or their hands, subject to the suture orders of the general assembly.
