BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 21, 1791.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore issue to Francis Clements a certificate for the sum of sixty-nine pounds ten shillings and three-pence, on interest from the nineteenth day of September, seventeen hundred and eighty-four, of the same tenor and date of the one heretofore issued him, in lieu of the aforesaid certificate lost, on his entering into bond with security, to be approved by the treasurer, to indemnify this state in case the said certificate should hereafter appear to have been paid by the state.
