The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolution:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, APRIL 5, 1792.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be authorized and are hereby required to appoint some person to collect all sums of money and tobacco which did belong to Robert Chrillie, late sheriff of Baltimore county, and were forfeited to this state, except the public and county dues; and that the said person, before he begins to collect, shall give bond, with sufficient security, for the faithful discharge of his duty in collecting the same; which said bond shall be lodged in the treasury of the western shore; and that the governor and council allow said person a commission not exceeding ten per cent. for collection.

The supplement to an act, entitled, An act to provide for the further encouragement and establishment of Washington college, and to an act, entitled, An act for founding a college on the western shore of this state, and constituting the same, together with Washington college on the eastern shore, into one university, by the name of the University of Maryland, passed November session, seventeen hundred and eighty-four, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk of the senate.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOURS,

WE have appointed Mr. John Worthington to join the member named in your message to request the attendance of the governor elect for the purpose of qualifying.

The honourable Thomas Sim Lee, Esquire, the governor elect, attending in the senate room, ORDERED, That William Tilghman and William Hindman, Esquires, inform the house of delegates the honourable Thomas Sim Lee, Esquire, the governor elect, is attending in the senate room to qualify as governor of the state of Maryland, and request their attendance.

The speaker, attended by the members of the house of delegates, appeared in the senate room, and the honourable Thomas Sim Lee, Esquire, qualified as governor before the president of the senate, in the presence of both houses, by taking the oaths directed by the constitution and form of government, the oath of office prescribed by law, and by taking an oath to support the constitution of the United States, and also by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the christian religion.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolution:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, APRIL 5, 1792.

Whereas it is represented to this general assembly, by the petition of Richard Barnes, of Saint-Mary's county, that on the second day of June, seventeen hundred and eighty-one, he paid to the treasurer of the western shore the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, on account of Hanbury and Lloyd, merchants, London, pursuant to an act of assembly of October, seventeen hundred and eighty; that he has since that time settled all accounts with the said Hanbury and Lloyd; and praying a return of the money paid into the treasury as aforesaid; and the said facts appearing to this general assembly to be true, RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore pay unto Richard Barnes the aforesaid sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, being the same money heretofore deposited in the treasury as aforesaid.
