W E D N E S D A Y, November 7, 1792.

THE same members appeared as on yesterday. John Hall and Charles Goldsborough, Esquires, appeared in the senate; who adjourn until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

T H U R S D A Y, November 8, 1792.

THE same members appeared as on yesterday, except John Hall, Esquire. William Tilghman, Esquire, appeared in the senate. The members present adjourn until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

F R I D A Y, November 9, 1792.

THE same members appeared as on yesterday. James Hollyday, Esquire, appeared in the senate. The members present adjourn until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

S A T U R D A Y, November 10, 1792.

THE same members appeared as on yesterday; who adjourned until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

M O N D A Y, November 12, 1792.

THE same members appeared as on Saturday, except William Tilghman, Esquire. Benjamin Stoddert, John Eager Howard and Richard T. Lowndes, Esquires, appeared in the senate.

A sufficient number of members to compose a senate being convened, they severally qualified before Allen Quynn, Esquire, one of the justices of the peace of Anne-Arundel county, by taking and subscribing the several oaths required by the constitution and form of government, by subscribing a declaration of their belief in the christian religion, and by taking, repeating and subscribing, the oath to support the government of the United States.
