

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, November, 1792.

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The resolution respecting Margaret Maxwell, was read the second time by especial order and dissented to.

The resolution respecting Joseph Lemmon, was read the second time by especial order and unanimously dissented to.

Which last mentioned bill and resolutions were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk of the senate.

The bill concerning Forest-street, in Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, was read the second time by especial order and will pass. Said bill was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk of the senate.

The president communicates to the senate a petition from the securities of Thomas Williams, heretofore collector of the tax for Prince-George's county, praying to be released from the payment of the wheat and tobacco tax imposed by the act of June, 1780; and also a petition from Robert Gill Hampton, late a soldier in the Maryland line, praying that certificates may be issued for his services in the late war, in lieu of those obtained by improper suggestions of his death; which were severally read, referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent by the clerk of the senate.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

T H U R S D A Y, November 15, 1792.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The president communicates to the senate a petition from John L. Elbert and Samuel Y. Keene, assistant surgeons of the late Maryland regiments, praying commutation pay for their services as assistant regimental surgeons; which was read, referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent by the clerk of the senate.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to lay out and open a road to and from the mill of Benjamin Lawrence and Elias Dorsey, on the western fork of Patapsco Falls, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 15, 1792: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The president communicates to the senate a petition from Nathan Foster, late a soldier in the fifth Maryland regiment; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, James M^cHenry, Esquire, brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act supplementary to an act, entitled, An act to erect and establish an insurance fire company in Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, and for other purposes; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolution:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 16, 1792.

RESOLVED, That the register of the land-office for the western shore, on payment of the usual fees, be and he is hereby authorized and directed to grant to Edward Abell, of St. Mary's county, a patent for the two lots of land situate and lying in Mill Manor, in St. Mary's county, which were purchased of the commissioners of confiscated property by Michael Beverly, of the said county, provided the said Abell will pay to the treasurer of the western shore the sum of eleven pounds two shillings and four-pence, in specie or specie certificates.
