THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. John Eager Howard, Esquire, appeared in the senate. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolution and message respecting Robert Long were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk of the senate.

The amendment to the bill, entitled, An act respecting the trustees of the new church in the city of Annapolis, was read, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed:

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolution:

By THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 18, 1792.

Whereas the chancellor of Maryland, by his decree made at October term last, did, amongst other things, order and direct, that a bond passed to the state of Maryland by Levin Winder and John Gale, should be delivered up to the said Levin Winder and John Gale, to be cancelled; therefore, RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby directed to deliver up to the said Levin Winder and John Gale, or either of them, their bond, to be cancelled.

Which was read the first and second time by especial order, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk of the senate.

On motion, William Tilghman, Esquire, brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act in favour of the president and directors of the Patowmack company and the commissioners of the federal buildings; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the bill, entitled, An act for the prevention of lotteries, thus endorsed; By the house of delegates, December 14, 1792: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Amendment proposed. In the third line of the proviso, strike out the words "proposed by advertisement in any news-paper of this state before the passage," and insert, "or may be proposed and published, by advertisement or otherwise, in any county of this state before the commencement."

William Tilghman, Esquire, from the committee appointed to report amendments to the bill, entitled, An act in favour of Thomas, James, Baker and Roger Johnson, and Josias Clapham, brings in and delivers the following amendment; which was read, agreed to, the bill passed as amended, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk of the senate.

Amendment proposed. Page 1st, 4th line from the bottom, after the word "any," insert "male."

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to prevent the setting on fire the Catoctin, South and North mountains, thus endorsed; By the house of delegates, December 17, 1792: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

James Hollyday, Esquire, informed the senate, that the conferrees appointed by both houses on the bill respecting the militia, had met, but could not agree in a report; thereupon, ORDERED, That the bill, entitled, An act to arrange, regulate and discipline, the militia of this state, according to an act of the congress of the United States, entitled; An act more effectually to provide for the national defence, by establishing an uniform militia throughout the United States, be committed to James Hollyday, Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, and James M^oHenry, Esquires, to report amendments thereto.

The president communicates to the senate a memorial from Michael J. Stone, Esquire, chief justice of the first judiciary district; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.
