We framed a militia bill at a very early period; and we thought it most proper that the bill for the valuation of property should originate in your house. These are almost the only subjects of public importance to which our attention has been called, and we have endeavoured to give them all the dispatch which was consistent with mature deliberation; we will give the utmost attention to the business now before us, and hope to be able to rise to-sporrow.
