THE senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday, except John Eager Howard, James Hollyday, John Campbell and Richard Tasker Lowndes, Esquires. Charles Goldsborough, Esquire, appeared in the senate. The members present adjourn till to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

T U E S D A Y, November 19, 1793.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of Saturday and Monday were read. John Campbell, John Eager Howard, James Hollyday and Richard T. Lowndes, Esquires, appeared in the senate. Brice Thomas Beale Worthington, Esquire, appeared in the senate, and qualified before Allen Quynn, Esquire, one of the justices of the peace for Anne-Arundel county, by taking the several oaths required by the constitution and form of government, and subscribing a declaration of his belief in the christian religion, and also by taking an oath to support the constitution of the United States.

James Hollyday, Esquire, brings in and delivers to the president a memorial from Henry Harford, Esquire; which was read, and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The bill, entitled, An act to open a road through part of Frederick and Baltimore counties to Lawrence and Dorsey's mills on Patapsco falls, was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Daniel Bowley, Esquire, from the committee, brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act to establish a bank in the district of Columbia; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Mariamne Craik Clark and Mary Clark, of Prince-George's county, was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act to aid the proceedings of Allegany county court, and for the adjournment of the said court, was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act further extending the exclusive privilege granted to Gabriel Peterson Vanhorn and Robert Hodgson, by certain acts of this state, to keep and run stage carriages, was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act to ascertain the salary of members of the council, was read the first and second time by especial order, and passed.

The bill, entitled, An act concerning Temple-street, in Baltimore-town, was read the first and second time by especial order, and passed.

The bill, entitled, An act to alter and change the name of George Washington Eyers to George Washington Nicholson, was read the first and second time by especial order, and passed.

The bill, entitled, An act for valuing the lot or lots of ground in Upper-Marlborough, in Prince-George's county, on which the inspecting houses stand, and for paying the proprietor the value thereof, was read the first and second time, and passed with the proposed amendment.

The amendment proposed. In the 12th line from the top of the first page, in the first enacting clause, after the word "empowered" strike out the words "and directed," and insert the words "if they judge it for the interest of the county."

The bill, entitled, An act to establish the road from the Turkey Foot road towards Braddock's road as a public road, and for other purposes therein mentioned, was read the first and second time by especial order, and passed with the proposed amendment.

The amendment proposed. In the fifth and sixth lines from the top of the first page, strike out the words "a tract of land called."

The bill, entitled, An act to prevent sheep and swine from going at large in the town of Cumberland, in Allegany county, was read the first and second time by especial order, and passed.

The bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Joseph Johnson, of Charles county, was read the first and second time by especial order, and passed.
