W E D N E S D A Y, November 20, 1793.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The following bills, to wit, The bill, entitled, An act to ascertain the salary of members of the council, the bill, entitled, An act concerning Temple-street, in Baltimore-town, the bill, entitled, An act to alter and change the name of George Washington Eyers to George Washington Nicholson, the bill, entitled, An act for the valuing the lot or lots of ground in Upper-Marlborough, in Prince-George's county, on which the inspecting houses stand, and for paying the proprietor the value thereof, the bill, entitled, An act to establish the road from the Turkey Foot road towards Braddock's road as a public road, and for other purposes therein mentioned, the bill, entitled, An act to prevent sheep and swine from going at large in the town of Cumberland, in Allegany county, and the bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Joseph Johnson, of Charles county, were severally sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to establish a market in Elizabeth-town, in Washington county, and for the regulation of the same, was read the first and second time by especial order, and passed.

James Hollyday, Esquire, delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act to enable the inhabitants of Saint-John's parish, lying in Queen-Anne's and Caroline counties, to elect vestrymen and churchwardens for said parish; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act to aid the proceedings of Allegany county court, and for the adjournment of the said court, was read the second time by especial order, and committed to Charles Goldborough, James Hollyday and John Campbell, Esquires, for amendments.

Benjamin Stoddert, Esquire, from the committee, brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Walter Smith; which was read the first and second time by especial order, and passed.

The following message was prepared, read a first and second time, and concurred with, to wit:

BY THE SENATE, NOVEMBER 20, 1793.

GENTLEMEN,

THE senate have passed a bill for the relief of Walter Smith, now in the gaol of Montgomery county. It is hard that an unfortunate citizen, in actual and unmerited confinement, should wait the operations of a general act at the end of the session, and we therefore hope that your house will pass the bill now sent you. The person to be relieved by it appears to be worthy the interposition of the general assembly in his favour.

The clerk of the house of delegates brings in and delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the justices of Dorchester county to assess and levy a sum of money on the inhabitants of said county for the purpose therein mentioned; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

And likewise the following resolution, to wit:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 20, 1793.

Whereas Thomas Yates, of Baltimore county, on the tenth of November, seventeen hundred and eighty-one, and fourth of February, seventeen hundred and eighty-two, at the sale of the confiscated estate of the Nottingham company, became the purchaser of four negro men, two negro women, and ten negro children, at the price of three thousand and twenty-six pounds, and bonded for the same, with Charles Myers and Jacob Myers, on the fifteenth of July, seventeen hundred and eighty-five, and the said Thomas Yates and Charles Myers have become insolvent, and the whole estate of the said Jacob Myers hath been, by his executors, applied to the payment of his debts: And whereas there has been paid to the state, on account of the said bonds and purchase, the sum of six hundred and twelve pounds four shillings and ten-pence in black state money, the sum of three hundred and nineteen pounds six shillings and ten-pence in specie, and the sum of fourteen thousand and eighty-four dollars and seventy-nine ninetieths in final settlement certificates, and in specie
