THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. Charles Carroll, Esquire, appeared in the senate. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorize and empower the justices of the peace of Caroline county to levy on the assessable property in said county a sum of money necessary to complete the court-house in said county, and for other purposes therein mentioned, the bill, entitled, An act to extend to certain foreigners the benefit of an act, passed November session, seventeen hundred and ninety-two, entitled, An act for the relief of certain foreigners who have settled within this state, further supplementary to the act for naturalization, and the bill, entitled, An act to confirm the title of certain lots of ground to the society of people called Quakers, in Baltimore-town, whereon is their meeting-house and burying-ground, were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, John E. Howard, Esquire, brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act for altering the time of holding the orphans court in Allegany county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The letter from his excellency the governor, enclosing a letter from the judges of the court of appeals, with the resolution in favour of Samuel Handy, and message of dissent to said resolution, were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The president communicates to the house a statement of the fees from the register in chancery, received by him for taxes on the several proceedings in the chancery-office, by virtue of an act of assembly, passed November session, seventeen hundred and ninety-two, amounting in the whole to the sum of five hundred twenty-nine pounds six shillings and eight-pence one farthing, for three quarters of a year; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent down by the clerk.
